Theories of Punishment

Why Punish?

- Utilitarian
- Retributive

Utilitarian Theory

- The utilitarian theory of punishment seeks to punish offenders to discourage, or "deter," future wrongdoing.
- This theory seeks to deter future crimes
 - Specific deterrence seeks to deter the specific person being punished
 - General deterrence seeks to deter society as a whole from committing crimes
- This also encompasses rehabilitation

Retributive Theory

 The retributive theory seeks to punish offenders because they deserve to be punished.

R v Dudley and Stephens

 Dudley and Stephens were shipwrecked along with two other men. When one of them, the cabin boy Richard Parker, fell into a coma, Dudley and Stephens decided to kill him for food. After a highly publicized trial they were convicted of murder and sentenced to death with a recommendation for clemency; the sentence was commuted to six months in prison.
